Bere Island Projects Group CLG were one of a number of community groups who launched their community archive on the Irish Community Archive Network (iCAN) at a nationwide event in Laragh, Co Wicklow on May 31st. The event in Wicklow also marked The Heritage Council's support of the programme.

The Irish Community Archive Network was established by the National Museum of Ireland in 2008 to encourage and support communities to collect and share their heritage online. Working in partnership with local authorities, to date, iCAN has supported the creation of 28 online archives in Clare, Cork, Galway, Mayo and Wicklow, with 8 more in development.

Bere Island Projects Group are one of four community groups in County Cork who are part of the project along with Youghal Community Archives, Kilshannig Heritage Society and the Independence Museum Kilmurry. Bere Island Projects Group have been actively documenting and preserving the island's heritage as part of their work on the Bere Island Conservation Plan, and in 2022 the group launched a project to record the island's oral history. These recordings will now be available on the island's community archive, along with old photographs and documents, and a mapping of the island graveyard.

Everyone is invited to contribute their stories, photographs and any information relating to the history of Bere Island to the community archive. The Bere Island community heritage archive can be accessed at https://bereisland.heritagecork.org

Commemorations Grant Scheme

Bere Island Projects Group have been awarded €4460 under the Cork County Heritage and Commemorations Grant Schemes to hold a Military Heritage Festival on the island in September, which will also conclude BIPG's programme of events for the Decade of Centenaries and celebrate the island's military heritage and its role during the War of Independence. BIPG plan this festival to become a yearly event,



celebrating all aspects of Bere Island's military heritage, from the construction of Martello Towers in the late 1700s to the presence of the British Admiralty and US Navy during WW1 and the War of Independence. This year's Cork County Council's Heritage and Commemorations Grant Schemes will see €93,309 of funding announced awarded to local community groups. Further details on the festival, which will take place over the weekend of Saturday 16th and Sunday 17th September will be announced over the coming weeks.

Bere Island Conservation Plan

Bere Island Projects Group CLG has been awarded €20,000 under the Heritage Council's Heritage Capacity Fund 2023 to undertake further actions under the Bere Island Conservation Plan.

This year marks the twentieth anniversary of the launch of the Conservation Plan. In 2001 with concerns for the long-term viability of the island community, and a realization that the island's built and archaeological heritage needed to be protected from further deterioration, Bere Island Projects Group, approached The Heritage Council and Cork County Council for their help. Following consultations with the islanders it was decided to put in place a Conservation Plan to protect both the island community, it's cultural, archaeological and built heritage and natural landscape. The Bere Island Conservation Plan was officially launched in 2003 by Éamon Ó Cuív TD.

The funding will be used to work on a number of actions in 2023, including continuing the oral history project, and developing a community archive with the Irish Community Archive Network, holding a full programme of events for National Heritage Week and launching the inaugural Bere Island Military Heritage Festival. Our Living Islands – National Islands Policy Document

Minister Humphreys this week launched a new 10-year policy to support vibrant and sustainable island communities, the first whole of Government Policy for the islands in 27 years. The ambitious policy has been developed following an extensive consultation process with island communities and other stakeholders, which enabled them to express their views as to the challenges and opportunities associated with living on islands. The Policy document can be viewed on https://www.gov.ie/en/policy-information/a7188-our-living-islands. The 3 year Action Plan also contains 80 commitments with a real focus on improving housing and water infrastructure, better access to essential services in health and education, delivering high speed broadband, supporting remote working and further developing outdoor amenities and sustainable tourism. Among the highlights of the Action Plan:

- Additional levels of support through the Government's Property Refurbishment Grant Scheme **Croí Cónaithe** as part of a major effort to turn vacant or derelict buildings on islands into long-term homes. Under this measure, the existing grant ceilings will be increased by 20% in recognition of the additional costs involved in construction on offshore islands.
 - Vacant Home Officers will identify vacant and derelict properties on our islands
 - The Government's forthcoming **planning guidelines for rural housing** will recognise the unique challenges that island communities face.
- **E-Health Pods** will also be piloted on our offshore islands to give residents and families improved access to health appointments.
- Supports will be provided to **Remote Working Facilities** on islands so that people can live and work within their own community.
- The delivery of **high-speed broadband** to island-based schools, digital hubs and Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) to ensure a reliable connection to the internet for both education and remote working.
- Supports for Outdoor Recreation Activities such as **cycling and swimming**, and expanding the **Walks Scheme** to more island projects.
- Working with Partners and Government Agencies to increase **job opportunities** , including **Apprenticeships** on islands.
 - Investment in infrastructure such as **piers and roads** , and the completion of the upgrade of **coast guard stations** of units servicing islands
 - Support the development of Waste Management Plans for island communities.

Irish Islands Marine Resource Organisation: Brexit Enterprise Development Fund There is 50% funding available, up to €200,000, for eligible businesses with suitable projects.
